Notes from the Sermon

As believers we are constantly bombarded with doubts. Doubts about our finances, doubts about our worth, doubts about our purpose, and even doubts about our faith in God. Is the story of the crucified king as recorded in the gospels and in our account of John, something that can build our faith? Is the cross and messianic prophecies just a really neat story? Or is there a divine and sovereign plan, a handprint that has been continually pointing us to a crucified King?

The cross of Christ cannot simply be a moment in history. As we read the gospel accounts of the crucifixion, we have to understand that they were written so we would respond in faith. Each glance to the cross should remind us that God has been faithful to his promises.

As we look to the descriptions and prophecies of the Messiah, written over a 1000 years before his life and death, we will find incredible faith that God did have a plan. And this plan is a constant reminder of his goodness, grace, mercy and love for his people. "
